JANUARY PROGRAM Susie Hoffman

Martha Wallace will be our demonstration artist for January 20th. She teaches children and adults in her Murphys studio and the local public schools. She will be giving a watercolor demo on a unique Japanese Masa paper, which is an oriental rice paper that she has been painting on for about 10 years.

Artist Statement:

"My journey with watercolors is an ongoing adventure and after 30 years, I still get excited whenever I start a new painting. The possibilities of this medium are endless as long as you are willing to experiment, which means failure along with success. As I tell my students, 'It's not the destination, it's the journey'.

My paintings are about my surroundings and life experiences, I sometimes work in a series of painting and take my subject to the limit, going in as many directions as possible, adjusting mostly in my mind the composition, color, shape, texture, sunlight and shadow. If I work from a limited sketch, I check for technical correctness, then it's 'playtime'. Continuing series include birds, nests, shells, leaves, window boxes, fruits and vegetables, flowers, plants, and pottery from the Southwest. I divide my time painting for myself and the galleries, teaching private classes to children and adults in my Murphys studio, and traveling to public schools to teach in the Arts in Education program. My paintings can be found at Tea Antiques, Art on Main in Murphys, and Town Hall Arts in Copperopolis, CA. Every day I get to do something I love."

FEBRUARY PROGRAM

Carolyn Macpherson will be our demo artist on February 17th. She will show how to reveal hidden layers of meaning in your paintings. Carolyn will demonstrate how to develop acrylic skins to lay over your watercolor designs created in a "free play" session. The result? Moody, evocative paintings that can be full of hidden messages, looking much like encaustic (wax) paintings.

Combining a lifelong fascination with color, photography and design, Carolyn has explored several media in her 30 years as an artist. She taught design principles, calligraphy and painting at a small junior college in Longview, Washington. She exhibited widely around the stare in her primary medium at that time, a combination of oil and collage used to create abstract landscape and garnered a number of regional art show awards. While in Washington, Carolyn was active in arts organizations and was elected to the Washington State Arts Advocacy Commission and for seven years she directed the second largest regional art show in the state, the Southwest Washington Arts Festival. Her philosophy has been that volunteering in the arts, rubbing elbows with artists and people who love art, keeps an artist's perspective fresh and challenged. She spent two years in Venezuela where she discovered she was allergic to oil paints and made a difficult but necessary switch to watercolor. She then studied under Tacoma artist Bill Colby. Seeking a sunnier climate than Washington, she moved to California in 1980 where she became an active member of the San Mateo Arts Council. As the Executive Director of the Bay Area Camp Fire Council for 5 years, it left her little time for art so she and her husband Richard moved to Arnold in 1988. She became involved in the Arts Council and served as the Council's president and was one of the original founders of the Art-Op Gallery in Murphys. Currently, Carolyn's watercolors and photography reflect her surroundings-Motherlode thunder clouds, golden hills, brightly colored bird and flowers interpreted through wet, transparent watercolors and sharp focus photographs with an occasional abstract impression thrown in for variety. Her pouring technique, used for the background of everything from koi fish, portraits, and skies to floral has become the signature for her style. She has won numerous first place awards at juried art shows in Northern California.

YOSEMITE, A GATHERING OF SPIRIT

The premier of the Ken Burns film, "Yosemite, A Gathering of Spirit" will be screened on Sonora's 2^{nd} Saturday Art Night, January 11^{th} at 5, 6 and 7 p.m. at the Sonora Opera Hall. This is honor of Yosemite's 150^{th} Anniversary and is a free event. There will be a no host bar courtesy of TCAA. At 8 p.m. Lee Stetson will be performing as John Muir and tickets for that will be \$10 at the door. Don't forget the 2^{nd} Art Night in Sonora from 5 - 8 p.m. where you can experience music and art in the downtown area.

<u>FEATURED ARTIST</u> <u>Sarah Anne Graham</u>

Sarah Anne Graham currently lives in California. After a few years traveling around the United States and abroad; from Virginia, Georgia, Oregon (a brief time in New Zealand), Pennsylvania and Idaho to her current residence in California, she is working on oil paintings of the landscape of the Sierra Nevada foothills, as well as continuing her work on woodblock transfers on maps.

Graham's paintings are mostly representational depictions of the natural world, with the occasional object inserted, that are used to symbolize loss, arrested development or other emotions. The surreal quality of these paintings illicit ambiguity and are meant to provoke further investigation.

Her recent prints are abstracted landscapes. The woodblock transfers onto maps remind the viewer of the role of conservation, management and the nomenclature of science to classify and collect info on the natural world. Her works have been shown in one-person and group exhibitions in the US, as well as New Zealand. Graham studied at the Atlanta College of Art and received her BFA from Oregon State University in 2003 in painting and printmaking.

Rounds series: woodcuts/mixed media

These works are represented come from one series and originate with one image. They are of a woodland scene, carved on wood and printed on various watersheds, soil and vegetation taxonomy maps throughout the Northwest. Once the plate was transferred onto these maps, it was then colored on and cut through, using paper cutting techniques to give the illusion of lace. This process was done to express the fragility of our local ecosystems, and the role that conservation plays in managing our natural environments.

These works are still in progress, and cover various techniques to gain the result of both natural and manmade effects on the ecosystems we come in contact with. Works from this series have been exhibited in:

The History Corner Loretta Pagni

HISTORY OF MOTHER LODE ART ASSN:

According to records in our programs to our Art Show Exhibitions Wes Wyllie and Ruth Wyllie were well involved in the Mother Lode Art Association from the 60's and into the 70's. Mr. Weston Wyllie was Program Chairman then became President, Vice Show Chairman as well as Show Chairman and a Director. Wes became a well know watercolorist and also worked in oils. My sister-in-law Susan Pagni owns two of Weston Wyllie's paintings. Ruth Wyllie was secretary for several years and also co-show Chairman along with Willa Barber. Wes and Ruth had four sons: Paul, Jerry, Ed and Gene. One son, Ed Wyllie is the head of the Sonora Area Foundation that Irving Symons created. One of the listings of the Foundation is: The Wyllie Family Scholarship Fund for Art students at Sonora High School.

I went to high school with Paul Wyllie.

More History:

In 1963 the president was Mrs. Helen Jasper, Vice-President: Mrs. Elvira Mahoney, Secretary: Mrs. Julia Valentine and Treasurer: Mrs. Mary Burden. The Directors were Mr. Lino Borelli, Exhibition Chairman; Mrs. Blanche Dennis, Exhibition Secretary; Mrs. Elinor, Publicity and Mr. Weston Wyllie, Program Chairman. (Weston Wyllie was also program chairman in 1964, In 1965 Wes was President).

During that year the 11th Annual Art Show was held at the Tuolumne County Garage where the Court is now held on Washington Street. The yearly dues were only \$5.00 for members and \$20.00 for Patrons. Program brochures were made available for 25 cents including a coupon for a door prize drawing. The prize for the drawing was a watercolor painting by Mr. Weston Wyllie.
