Kim has truly studied her craft and spent many an hour simply experimenting to get to where she wants to be. Very inspiring to me and again brings me back to the desire to spend more of my time doing just that—exploring my artistic skills. Next month's program will be Heinie Hartwig. I am not familiar with his work, but I trust and applaud **Susie Hoffman** for her diligence in getting us such fine programs.

The picnic is in June at the Hurst Ranch outside of Jamestown. We should all look forward to a good time, whatever the committee decides for this annual event. Please be thinking about who you can invite to join us. It is no secret that we are all aging and if we don't get some new and younger members, the art association will not survive. Consider sponsoring a young up and coming artist.

MAY PROGRAM Susie Hoffman

Heinie Hartwig will be our premier artist for the May demonstration. Heinie has combined a lifelong fascination of American Indian lore and habits with impressionable childhood memories of growing up in the open spaces of a 4,000 acre cattle ranch, now in his seventies, Heinie could not resist the moody effects and fascinating lure of an unspoiled and ever changing desert landscape. As a current resident of the impressionable Sierra Foothills, Mr. Hartwig still finds the solitude and surroundings for an endless supply of possible compositions.

Though most of his past works have lent themselves to the market demands of the highly popular "western" theme, his current genius rests in landscapes fashioned after such notable 19th century artists as Bierstadt, Hill, Johnson and Innes. His "old word" style of color—balanced value and light upon dark creates an aesthetically arresting mood. Heinie describes his style as "atmospheric realism handled in an impressionistic or semi-detailed manner. While the mind usually remembers a photograph, a more mysterious visual effect can be created by drawing the imagination into a more loose and romantic style. Creating nature's constantly changing atmospheric qualities is my greatest challenge"

Years of studying the great masters and experimentation convinced Heinie that strength, durability and long lasting sharpness of color comes with the use of "old world" color formulas. Many of Heinie's paintings are sought after by international collectors.

All this is to confirm what thousands of Heinie Hartwig originals provide for those who have invested in the quality that offers a sparkle of serenity and quiet beauty—a constant reminder of "the way it was."
